Astronomy and Astrophysics

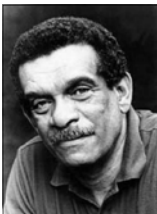

The Library announces another brand-new display featuring works by writers as varied and colorful as their garb. Tales related to lifetime experiences growing up and living in Trinidad, St. Lucia, Jamaica, Antigua, and other neighboring islands can be found in this north-entrance display, "Caribbean Authors". Jamaica Kinkaid ("Annie John"), Sam Selvon ("Moses Ascending"), and Merle Hodge ("Crick Crack, Monkey") are but a few represented in this display that will continue through October. Following a generous monetary donation from the Caribbean Students Association (CSA), the Library worked with this group to purchase a select listing of Caribbean literature. These new Library materials offer a unique glimpse into picturesque fictional, biographical, and historical diversity.

Banned Books
